wildlife ways - the story

After years of planning, planting and building, Wildlife Ways is nearly finished - and Solihull is much greener. Since January 2019 trees and wildflowers have been planted, paths laid, funding for further environmental projects awarded, and a website was created to keep residents informed.

The £16.8 million programme, part-funded by the European Regional Development Fund (ERDF), has been a massive project involving people from right across the Council, from a host of different teams.

The project is made up of four parts.

Wildlife

Planting hundreds of trees, thousands of square metres of wildflower areas and millions of bulbs has improved our wildlife habitats and the connections between them.

It has been a massive boost to wildlife and will see a more diverse range of plants and animals making their homes in Solihull, increasing the borough's biodiversity. Planting on this scale will also help improve our air quality and create a wildlife network more capable of adapting to climate change.

Alongside these other activities, colleagues have been working with local businesses to encourage employees to make more sustainable travel choices - including walking and cycling. This is supported by Wildlife Ways as the project will make it easier to leave the car behind.

Another feature of Wildlife Ways is the Greater Birmingham and Solihull Local Enterprise Partnership (GBSLEP) Habitats Grants Programme. This is a way of supporting smaller organisations to improve their land and areas of waterway both for people and wildlife.
