



### Added Value - Deliver Value Optimising the use of land

The team brings a creative approach to delivering value Schemes which are landscape-led take a holistic approach to design, to minimise the use of resource intensive materials.

### Working with nature

Responding to a changing climate Concern over the use of natural resources and the potential effects of climate change, mean that it is important to ensure that the sustainable use of natural resources is the backbone of design.

Landscape and topography have a significant impact on how settlements form. The team read natural and manmade features, and understand the land's past, how it functions and how it is perceived. They also understand what places will look like in the future. These skills are as relevant to the often neglected urban fringe as they are to areas of land that are nationally designated for their heritage value.
