Summary of findings:		

Main conclusions on the likely impact of the proposed savings on different equality groups (protected characteristics):

The design of a high quality environment is vital to support a range of priority issues such as better health and education, crime reduction and improvements in community cohesion and social cohesion.

Parks provide a valuable and important community facility; offering free open access and enabling informal interaction between people of different backgrounds and age groups, as well as providing a free facility for physical activity, which contributes to various health objectives. Consultation has shown that usage of parks is high across all groups. All groups appear to place a high importance on parks, although in relation to other public services the level of importance does differ. Satisfaction is high across all groups, although there are some notable variations for Black, Asian and Minority Ethnic communities and geographical communities, reasons for this are not yet fully understood.

Overall, amenities are aimed at all age groups, but users and non-users would like more targeted provision for teenagers and adults. A lack of some specific facilities, such as toilets, provides an obvious barrier to certain groups of people being able to use parks. However, in light of previous maintenance and anti-social behaviour concerns, as well as diminishing budgets it is not feasible to introduce toilets across our parks, instead we will look to increase partnerships where nearby facilities can be used by our park visitors.

A lot of work has taken place to improve accessibility and security, and to reduce dog fouling/littering. This has included, for example, installing seating/resting points, introducing accessible parking bays, resurfacing and widening paths, improving/increasing signage, introducing a Parkmobility Scheme enabling those with mobility problems to borrow wheelchairs for use in parks, working in partnership to review vandalism/security concerns, and increasing informal surveillance. Through inspection and maintenance arrangements we are able to address any areas of concern as and when they arise.

Play areas are highly valued by all sectors of the community, and provide the main reason for overall visits to parks. Significant investment has taken place across the borough, with a focus on the north, to improve and upgrade play areas and youth facilities. There has been a strong focus on inclusive play and consultation has been undertaken widely on a site-by-site basis to ensure children and young people have been able to influence the content and design of their play areas. Targeted consultation has also taken place with disabled children and young people to ensure that developments meet their specific needs.

Although many positive impacts have been identified there is still a lot of work that needs to take place. Access audits on each of our 18 principal parks will go a long way in informing priorities on a site-by-site basis. Some reasons for non-usage and/or desired improvements in parks are understood for different community groups, but additional analysis and consultation needs to take place to fully inform our improvements.
