

# Archaeological Assessment to Inform the Solihull Metropolitan Borough Council Local Plan



Final Report

# **Executive Summary**

The Archaeological Information and Advice (AI&A) service at Warwickshire County Council has been commissioned to undertake an Archaeological Assessment for 20 sites within the administrative boundary of Solihull Metropolitan Borough Council which have been identified as proposed Strategic Development Sites for inclusion within the Borough Council's Local Plan. The primary purpose of the assessment is to consider the archaeological potential of the proposed sites and the impact, with respect to archaeology, of any development within them.

The study has been commissioned by Solihull Metropolitan Borough Council. All relevant data held by the Solihull Historic Environment Record (HER), other relevant HERs and Record Offices, has been consulted during the course of this assessment.

This document presents the results of that assessment, and includes:

- a summary of the state of archaeological knowledge about each site and the potential for previously unknown archaeological deposits to survive across the site:
- The likely impact that the past use of each site would have had on any archaeological deposits which may be present.
- The significance of any such archaeological features and their sensitivity to change.
- The Historic Landscape Character of each site and this character's sensitivity to change.
- a map of each proposed site showing the known heritage assets within and in the vicinity of the proposed site;
- Maps to show known Heritage Assets and other relevant information for each site and an area surrounding it, proportionate to the size of the site up to 1000m from the development boundary of the site.
- a preliminary assessment of the archaeological implications of the proposed development of each site.

A preliminary archaeological planning recommendation, based on the state of current knowledge, is also made for each site. This may, in some cases, include a recommendation for more detailed assessment or investigation; such investigations may influence subsequent recommendations.

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# <u>Archaeological Assessment Methodology</u>

# General Methodology

A basic archaeological assessment has been undertaken of 20 proposed Strategic Sites (PSS) to inform Solihull Metropolitan Borough Council's Local Plan. The study has been commissioned by the Planning Department of Solihull Metropolitan Borough Council.

This assessment has considered the archaeological potential of the proposed Strategic Sites, the likely effect of the past use of the sites on any archaeological deposits across the site and the likely impact of the proposed developments upon any known, and/or unknown archaeological deposits which survive across each of the proposed sites.

This document presents the results of that assessment, and includes:

- a summary of the state of archaeological knowledge about each site and the potential for previously unknown archaeological deposits to survive across the site.
- The likely impact that the past use of each site would have had on any archaeological deposits which may be present.
- The significance of any such archaeological features and their sensitivity to change.
- The Historic Landscape Character of each site and this character's sensitivity to change.
- a map of each proposed site showing the known heritage assets within and in the vicinity of the proposed site;
- Maps to show known Heritage Assets and other relevant information for each site and an area surrounding it, proportionate to the size of the site up to 1000m from the development boundary of the site.
- a preliminary assessment of the archaeological implications of the proposed development of each site.

A preliminary archaeological planning recommendation is also made for each site. In a number of cases this includes a recommendation for more detailed study; such studies may influence subsequent recommendations.

The archaeological assessment has been undertaken by archaeologists in the Archaeological Information and Advice (Al&A) section of Warwickshire County Council. All relevant data readily available to the Al&A team has been consulted during the course of this assessment.

The principal sources of information that have been consulted to inform this assessment include:

- The Solihull Historic Environment Record (HER), comprising:
  - HER database records;
  - Historic Landscape Characterisation (HLC) data;
  - o Modern and historic aerial photographs;
  - National Mapping Programme (NMP) digital plots;
  - o Historic, modern and geological maps;
  - o 'Grey literature' reports on previous archaeological fieldwork undertaken within Solihull:

- Secondary sources
- Data held by Historic England for Designated Heritage Assets such as Scheduled Monuments, Registered Parks and Gardens, Listed Buildings, Conservation Areas
- Data held by the Warwickshire County Record Office and the Solihull Heritage and Local Studies section, Solihull Library.
- Data from adjacent HERs and Record Offices where sites border the Borough Boundary and a 1000m buffer would go into those areas outside of Solihull.
- The West Midlands Research Framework<sup>1</sup>

This assessment has also been undertaken in light of the results of the "Archaeological Resource Assessment of the Aggregates Producing Areas of Warwickshire and Solihull" project completed in 2008 by this office and funded by the Aggregates Levy Sustainability Fund through English Heritage (project No. 4681)<sup>2</sup>, hereafter referred to as the *Archaeological Resource Assessment*.

The primary aims of the *Archaeological Resource Assessment* project were to "improve the quality and quantity of available archaeological data in respect of potential aggregate producing areas and to facilitate more informed advice concerning the impacts and mitigation of aggregates extraction."

A process of archaeological data enhancement and validation was undertaken and a baseline of current archaeological data produced. An assessment was made of the current state of knowledge, resulting in the identification of a number of specific priority research topics for each time period.

Several mineral extraction sites which had been subject to past archaeological investigation were considered as case studies. These, along with the results from previous studies undertaken elsewhere, informed a consideration of the various issues associated with the management of the archaeological resource across proposed aggregate extraction areas and other large development sites.

The conclusions and advice resulting from this project is also applicable to assessing large proposed development sites.

It should be highlighted that the absence of any known archaeological sites within the immediate vicinity of a proposed development site does not necessarily indicate an absence of archaeological potential. There are a number of reasons for archaeological sites not having been previously identified across an area; for example, due to a previous lack of investigation, or an underlying geology or agricultural regime which hinders cropmark generation and site identification. Absence of evidence cannot therefore be taken as evidence of absence. The assessment of the archaeological potential of each site takes this into account.

It is emphasised that this study represents a basic level assessment of the archaeological potential of these sites, using only information held by the AI&A service and where relevant, information from: the Warwickshire County Record (CRO), the Solihull Heritage and Local Studies section, Solihull Library, HER information held by neighbouring local authorities and Record Office Information from adjacent counties.

It is likely that further archaeological assessment of a wider range of sources including, for example, that resulting from an in depth research of records held by the CRO, aerial photographs held by Historic England, information on past disturbance across a site held by landowners, would further inform the assessment of the archaeological implications of the proposed strategic sites. The archaeological planning recommendation may be revised following more detailed examination of individual sites. Moreover, additional information may be received by the HER office at some future point, increasing our understanding of the archaeology of a particular area.

Note that the significance of any hedgerows within or bounding the sites has not been assessed in respect of the Hedgerows Regulations 1997 as part of this project.

# **Mapping**

Each site specific assessment is accompanied by maps showing:

- Designated Heritage Assets
- Non designated Heritage Assets (Monuments)
- Events
- 1st Edition OS mapping from the late 19<sup>th</sup> century.
- Historic Landscape Character Mapping

The maps have been reproduced at the scale considered best to display the archaeological monuments most relevant to the archaeological assessment.

# **Statutory Framework**

The site specific planning recommendations which follow have been compiled in accordance with the guidelines for the treatment of heritage assets<sup>4</sup> (including archaeological remains) in the planning process as outlined within the National Planning Policy Framework: Planning (NPPF). They have also take into account the relevant legislation, detailed below, relating to any relevant designated sites.

# **The National Planning Policy Framework**

National Planning Policy Framework (NPPF) sets out the Government's planning policies for England and how these are expected to be applied. Chapter 12: Conserving and Enhancing the Historic Environment of NPPF provides guidance for planning authorities, property owners, developers and others on the conservation and investigation of heritage assets which will enable the Government's vision for the historic environment<sup>5</sup>

The Government's Planning Practice Guidance<sup>6</sup> (PPG), provides further information on how national policy should be interpreted and applied locally and emphasises the support for sustainable development as required by NPPF. The section Conserving and Enhancing the Historic Environment included within the PPG provides specific guidance on matters relating to protecting the historic environment.

Historic England's Good Practice Advice (GPA) also provides supporting information on good practice, notably looking at the principles of how national policy and guidance can be applied. The GPA follows the main themes of the planning system: plan making and decision taking and other issues significant for good decision making affecting heritage assets. The GPA currently consists of three separate advice notes.

GPA1 – Local Plan Making<sup>7</sup>

GPA2 – Managing Significance in Decision-Taking in the Historic Environment<sup>8</sup>

GPA3 – Setting and Views<sup>9</sup>

The Good Practice Advice notes 1, 2 and 3 supersede the PPS 5 Practice Guide which has now been withdrawn by the Government.

# The Historic Environment and Plan-Making

Paragraph 126 of the NPPF requires that local authorities 'should set out in their Local Plan a positive strategy for the conservation and enjoyment of the historic environment, including heritage assets most at risk through neglect, decay or other threats' and that 'in doing so, they should recognise that heritage assets are an irreplaceable resource and conserve them in a manner appropriate to their significance'. This is reiterated in paragraph 004 of Conserving and Enhancing the Historic Environment within the PPG which states that 'in developing their strategy, local planning authorities should identify specific opportunities within their area for the conservation and enhancement of heritage assets'.

Paragraph 169 of the NPPF states that, when plan making, Local planning authorities should have up-to-date evidence about the historic environment in their area and use it to assess the significance of heritage assets and the contribution they make to their environment', and that they should 'also use it to predict the likelihood that currently unidentified heritage assets, particularly sites of historic and archaeological interest, will be discovered in the future'. It further confirms that Local Planning Authorities should either maintain or have access to a historic environment record.

The Solihull Historic Environment Record (HER) contains information about known heritage assets within the Solihull Borough. It is curated by the Warwickshire County Council Archaeological Information and Advice team on behalf of Solihull Metropolitan Borough Council. It has been extensively consulted during the course of this project.

In addition Paragraph 156 of the NPPF requires Local Planning Authorities to set out strategic priorities for an area within the Local Plan and that this should include conservation and enhancement of the natural and historic environment, including landscape.

# **Planning Applications and the Historic Environment**

As set out within paragraph 128 of the NPPF, when determining applications local planning authorities should require an applicant to describe the significance of any heritage asset affected including the contribution made by their setting. Where a site on which development is proposed includes or has the potential to include heritage assets with archaeological interest, local planning authorities should require developers to submit an appropriate desk based assessment and where necessary a programme of field evaluation.

The aim of such an evaluation would be to obtain sufficient information on the presence/absence, character, extent, state of preservation of any archaeological deposits present in order to inform an assessment of their significance and the impact that the proposed development would have upon these.

Policy relating to designated heritage assets is set out within Paragraph 132 of the NPPF which requires that when considering the impact of a proposed development on the significance of a designated heritage asset, great weight to be given to the asset's conservation. As heritage assets are irreplaceable, any harm or loss should require clear and convincing justification. Substantial harm to or loss of a grade II listed building, park or garden should be exceptional. Substantial harm to or loss of designated heritage assets of the highest significance, notably Scheduled Monuments, Protected Wreck Sites, Registered Battlefields, Grade I and II\* Listed

Buildings, Grade I and II\* Registered Parks and Gardens, and World Heritage Sites, should be wholly exceptional.

The NPPF further acknowledges that there are also non-designated heritage assets of archaeological interest with archaeological interest that are demonstrably of equivalent significance and confirms that these should also be considered subject to the policies relating to designated assets.

Paragraph 133 of the NPPF requires that where a proposed development will lead to substantial harm to or total loss of significance of a designated heritage asset, local planning authorities should refuse consent, unless it can be demonstrated that the substantial harm or loss is necessary to achieve substantial public benefits that outweigh that harm or loss, or all of the following apply:

- (a) the nature of the heritage asset prevents all reasonable uses of the site; and
- (b) no viable use of the heritage asset itself can be found in the medium term that will enable its conservation; and
- (c) conservation through grant-funding or some form of charitable or public ownership is not possible; and
- (d) the harm to or loss of the heritage asset is outweighed by the benefits of bringing the site back into use'.

In some instances a development may have an impact upon heritage assets which are not of sufficient significance to preclude development. In these instances, and in accordance with the provisions of Paragraph 141 of the NPPF local planning authorities should require developers to record and advance understanding of the significance of any heritage assets to be lost (wholly or in part) in a manner proportionate to their importance and the impact, and to make this evidence (and any archive generated) publicly accessible. However, the ability to record evidence of our past should not be a factor in deciding whether such loss should be permitted.

The Warwickshire County Council Archaeological Information and Advice Team provide archaeological advice on planning matters to the Solihull Metropolitan Borough Council.

# <u>Designated Sites</u>

## **Scheduled Monuments**

Certain important archaeological sites are designated as Scheduled Monuments under the Ancient Monuments and Archaeological Areas Act 1979. Scheduling is at the discretion of the Secretary of State according to non-statutory criteria; by definition, Scheduled sites are sites of national importance. Scheduled sites are subject to stringent controls and formal consent is required for all works which would affect the significance of the site. There is a general presumption in favour of preservation *in situ* in respect of Scheduled sites.

# **Listed Buildings**

The Secretary of State for the Department for Digital, Culture, Media and Sport (DCMS) maintains a list of buildings of 'special architectural or historic interest' under

the Planning (Listed Buildings and Conservation Areas) Act 1990. This Act requires permission (Listed Building Consent) to be sought for any "demolition of a listed building or for its alteration or extension in any manner which would affect its character as a building of special architectural or historic interest" (para. 7) from the Local Planning Authority (para. 10).

The importance of the preserving these Listed Buildings and their settings is set out in paragraph 16 of this Act, which states 'In considering whether to grant listed building consent for any works the local planning authority or the Secretary of State shall have special regard to the desirability of preserving the building or its setting or any features of special architectural or historic interest which it possesses' (see also para. 66).

# Registered Parks and Gardens of Special Historic Interest and **Registered Battlefields**

Under the National Heritage Act 1953<sup>10</sup>, Historic England is empowered to maintain publicly accessible records and since 1984 they have been responsible for maintaining a Register of Parks and Gardens of Special Historic Interest in England<sup>11</sup>. Sites of exceptional historic interest are assessed as grade I, those of great historic interest as grade II\* and those of special historic interest as grade II.

Historic England also maintains a list of Registered Battlefields. This contains 46 important English battlefields.

# **Historic Landscape Character**

Solihull contains a wide variety of landscape types. They are what gives each locality within the area its own particular distinctiveness.

Historic landscape characterisation (HLC) is the process of understanding the character of the landscape in terms of historic environment by identifying patterns at landscape scale. HLC recognises that all landscapes are the result of historic processes, reflecting the ways in which human beings have interacted with and adapted their environment. It is a descriptive process, recognising and mapping landscape areas sharing similar characteristics according to broad type (e.g. settlement, fieldscape, woodland, industrial, designed landscape) and more detailed subtypes (within the category fieldscape, for example, there are a number of subtypes: meadow; planned enclosure, irregular, rectilinear etc.). Warwickshire County Council undertook its HLC project between 2006 and 2010 as part of a national programme supported by English Heritage (now Historic England).

By recognition of the wider historic environment, and its varying sensitivity to change, the capacity of different landscape types to absorb change may be assessed, and decisions can be made to preserve and enhance significant landscapes. It is

recommended that Historic Landscape Character data be used and taken into account as part of site-specific desk-based assessment and evaluations.

The European Landscape Convention contains an obligation to 'integrate landscape into regional and town planning policies... as well as any other policies with possible direct or indirect impact on landscape' (article 5d), whilst in the National Planning Policy Framework the definition of Heritage Asset includes landscape.

# **Archaeological Assessment.**

## Caveat:

It should be noted that this is a basic level assessment of the archaeological potential of these sites, using only information held by the HER office and that readily available from the Warwickshire County Record Office, Solihull Heritage and Local Studies section, Solihull Library, HERs in neighbouring local authorities and Record Offices within adjacent counties. It is likely that further archaeological assessment of a wider range of sources, for example more detailed examination of records held by the Warwickshire County Record office, aerial photographs held by Historic England, information on past disturbance across a site held by landowners, would further inform the assessment of the archaeological implications of the proposed development of these sites. The archaeological planning recommendation may be revised with the more detailed examination of individual sites.

Moreover, additional information may be received by the HER office in future, increasing our understanding of the archaeology of a particular area.

# A. General Recommendations

In addition to the recommendations made in respect of individual sites the following general recommendations are made, based on the *Archaeological Resource Assessment*, in particular Chapter 7 'Management of the Archaeological Resource'.

# **Archaeological Assessment:**

- Archaeological assessment should be undertaken at the earliest opportunity by a suitably qualified archaeologist.
  - In particular, detailed geomorphological work should be undertaken at the earliest opportunity (possibly undertaken in conjunction with developers during their geotechnical prospection activities) to allow the modelling of subsurface deposits in order to:
    - Predict the location of Pleistocene deposits likely to contain evidence of human activity during the Palaeolithic period;
    - Identify areas of alluvium and colluvium which have the potential for masking sites;
    - Identify palaeochannels in river terrace deposits;
    - Identify sites of particular value for palaeo-environmental studies. 12
- Any detailed archaeological evaluation should utilise any available appropriate assessment tools available, including:
  - Desk based assessment (documentary research, map regression analysis, Historic Landscape Characterisation);
  - Aerial photography/survey and other remote sensing (e.g. LIDAR);
  - Walkover survey;
  - Earthwork survey;
  - Field walking;
  - Volumetric sampling of test pits for artefacts;
  - Metal detector survey;
  - Geophysical survey;
  - Geochemical survey;
  - Auguring/boreholes/test pitting;
  - Trial trenching;

and should make use of any available data previously obtained by non-archaeologists, e.g. geotechnical survey results etc.

Where appropriate, specialists such as palaeo-environmentalists, geoarchaeologists and quarternary geologists should be consulted as part of the assessment process.

 Archaeological trial trenching should be undertaken at a sufficiently high sample percentage to identify the presence of archaeological deposits and their nature, extent and significance. Analysis of data gathered from aggregate extraction site case studies as part of the Archaeological Resource

Assessment has demonstrated, along with an earlier study<sup>13</sup>, that low levels of sampling can often miss significant archaeological features and/or fail to adequately characterise those identified. Further information on trial sampling strategies can be found within section 7 (in particular paras. 7.2.4.1.1, 7.2.5, 7.3.3.1) of the Archaeological Resource Assessment.

- While geophysical survey can provide useful information on the archaeological resource, and its use is recommended, previous work on sites has demonstrated that it often produces both false positive and false negative results. It is therefore recommended that bench testing be undertaken before field survey to determine the likely reliability of the results.
- Any hedgerows which will be affected should be assessed against the 1997 Hedgerows Regulations 1997 (Statutory Instrument 1997 No. 1160).
- The impact of the proposed development on archaeological landscapes and known monuments, including Listed Buildings, in the vicinity of the site should be considered as part of any archaeological assessment.
- The archaeological assessment should take into account any relevant Research Frameworks, including the West Midlands Research Framework as detailed in *The Archaeology of the West Midlands. A Framework for* Research<sup>14</sup>, and the specific research topics detailed within Section 6 of the Archaeological Resource Assessment.
- Historic Landscape Character should be considered as part of site-specific desk-based assessment and evaluations. Mineral extraction schemes should, where possible, minimise the changes to the historic landscape, and where this is unavoidable should make provision for the restoration of workings at the end of their life in ways which respect local historic landscape character.

# **Archaeological Mitigation:**

- Any archaeological mitigation strategy should take into account any relevant Research Frameworks, including the West Midlands Research Framework, and the specific research topics detailed within Section 6 of the Archaeological Resource Assessment reproduced.
- Where appropriate, relevant archaeological and other specialists should be consulted as part of any archaeological mitigation strategy.
- Where appropriate the Historic Landscape Character and the restoration of historic hedgerows should be considered during the development of any restoration schemes.
- Palaeo-environmental work should be undertaken where appropriate deposits are identified in order to obtain datable material and determine the nature of the contemporary environment. This should include recording alluvial sequences and palaeochannels which may be of intrinsic interest in their own right<sup>15</sup>.

- Where a programme of strip, map and sampling is to be undertaken as part of a mitigation strategy the Project Design should specifically state that the initial stripping level should be determined by the archaeology. All appropriate members of staff should be informed of this. Stripping should be by 360degree excavator with a toothless bucket and access roads should not use stripped areas except where essential and once they have been specifically identified as free from archaeology<sup>16</sup>.
- An appropriate programme of analysis and dissemination of the results of any fieldwork undertaken should be undertaken, and the deposition of any finds and archives with an appropriate body. This should include, where appropriate, the dissemination of the results through means additional to the final formal report, for example, through web pages, popular publications, etc.<sup>17</sup>.
- Where appropriate, public engagement and outreach should also be undertaken<sup>18</sup>.

Further information on prospection methodologies and the management of the archaeological resource can be found in Section 7 of the *Archaeological Resource Assessment*.

# **B. Site Specific Assessments and Recommendations**

# Site 1: Barretts Farm, Balsall Common

For data tables see Appendix 1

**Grid Ref:** SP 2473 7686

Site Size: 55.84 ha

# Geology:

The bedrock geology across the study area is dominated by the Mercia Mudstone Group, sedimentary bedrock formed approximately 201 to 252 million years ago in the Triassic Period.

Superficial geology consists of Oadby Member – Diamicton, Alluvium - Clay, Silt, Sand and Gravel and Glaciofluvial Deposits. These superficial deposits formed up to 2 million years ago in the Quaternary Period when the local environment would have been dominated by rivers and Ice Age conditions (British Geological Survey <a href="http://www.bgs.ac.uk/">http://www.bgs.ac.uk/</a>).

# **Historic Landscape Character Summary:**

Within the site boundary the predominant historic landscape character is planned enclosure (large rectilinear fields with straight boundaries) which appear to have been enclosed onto an area of common or waste land, probably in the 18th-19th century. There is also a small late 20th century recreation area and two historic farmsteads (Barretts Lane Farm and Pool Orchard).

Within the wider study area there are a number of zones of differing historic landscape character. To the northwest and southwest is the urban area of Balsall Common which is largely a post 1950s expansion of the settlement with some pockets of earlier 20th century settlement interspersed in between.

To the south and southeast are further areas of planned enclosure with straight roads, this is typical of an 18th-19th century fieldscape enclosed onto old common or waste. Interspersed within this are numerous historic farmsteads, most of them appearing to date to the 18th-19th century although some may be slightly earlier.

Whilst this agricultural activity may have caused some damage to any archaeological deposits predating this use, this damage is unlikely to have been extensive.

#### **Archaeological Potential of the PSS:**

The proposed development site lies within an area of archaeological potential. This area is likely to have been in agricultural use from at least the medieval period. Although few archaeological sites have been previously recorded across or in the wider vicinity of this area, this may be due to a lack of previous archaeological investigations across this area, rather than an absence of activity during the premedieval periods. There is therefore a potential for archaeological features associated with the known site to the west, and/or other previously unidentified archaeological features, pre-dating the medieval and later agricultural use of this site,

## **Archaeological Potential of the PSS:**

The proposed development site lies within an area of archaeological potential. It has been suggested that Betteridge Farm, which lies in the south western portion of this site, was the location of a medieval moated site (MSI3080). Parts of the moat may still survive as a large L-shaped pond to the east of the farm. Some of the buildings at Betteridge Farm are also shown on the 1st Edition OS map, suggesting that they date to at least the later 1880s, if not earlier. There is therefore a potential for the proposed development of this area to have an impact upon any archaeological features associated with the potential moated site and the occupation of this area from at least the medieval period.

A 'Tithe Barn' is shown on Yates Map of 1787-89 and later historic maps at the Tyburn Farm in the western portion of the site (MSI1601). This building is still extant. There is a potential for the proposed development of this area to have an impact

The Yates map also shows a building within what is now the Little Tyburn Coppice in the east-centre of the site, a further building is also shown to the west of this. The 1937 and 1955 Ordnance Survey maps show a series of widely space structures along the edge of a field in the northern portion of the site (410505, 277330). The use of these is unknown; they may be related to military activity. The development of this area could have an impact on any surviving remains relating to these structures.

A possible enclosure is visible as a cropmark on aerial photographs to the north of the site (MSI8569). This feature is presently undated, but may date from the prehistoric period onwards. Although few other pre-medieval archaeological sites have been previously recorded in the vicinity of the site, this may be due to a lack of previous archaeological investigations across this area, rather than an absence of activity during the pre-medieval periods. There is therefore a potential for previously unidentified archaeological features, pre-dating the medieval and later agricultural use of this site, to survive across the site.

As set out above, there is a potential for archaeological features detain from the prehistoric periods onwards to survive across the site. These may include archaeological deposits of regional or national importance, which may be worthy of preservation in situ.

Large portions of this site have been significantly disturbed by the construction of the existing roundabout and associated landscaping. This will have had a significant impact on any archaeological features which previously survived across large portions of this site.

### **Archaeological Potential of the PSS:**

The proposed development site lies within an area of archaeological potential. Although few relevant archaeological sites have been previously recorded in the wider vicinity of the site, this may be due to a lack of previous archaeological investigations across this area, rather than an absence of activity during the premedieval periods. There is therefore a potential for previously unidentified archaeological features, pre-dating the medieval and later agricultural use of this site, to survive across this area. There is also a potential for the remains of the original historic Chester Road, which was been replaced with the roundabout in this location in the 20th century, to survive across this area and be disturbed by the development across this site.

The site area is predominantly made up of a storage depot that previously was used as a military depot and site in World War Two. The site also includes a small area of rectilinear fields with straight boundaries forming part of a larger area of planned enclosure probably enclosed in the 18<sup>th</sup>-19<sup>th</sup> century.

Within the wider search area is a much more mixed historic landscape, north of the site is mostly large rectilinear fields with straight and curvilinear boundaries, planned enclosure. To the east are mostly large irregular fields on the floodplain of the River Blythe. To the North West there is the later 20<sup>th</sup> century housing expansion of Hampton in Arden.

The railway line divides the area to the south west, on the south western side of the railway is the historic core of the settlement of Hampton in Arden which has had some 20<sup>th</sup> century expansion up to the edge of the railway line. Also a mainly mixed area of irregular, rectilinear fields, designed parkland, woodland and a care home.

#### Past Disturbance to the PSS:

A large portion of the site was developed as an ammunition depot in the early 20th century and has since been used for material storage. This is likely to have had an impact on any archaeological features which previously survived across the site, however, the extent of this is presently unknown. As the majority of the previous development comprises the laying of concrete across the site, this impact may be less than it initially appears, dependent on the extent of ground disturbance associated its construction. The remainder of the site is in agricultural use, and probably has been since at least the medieval period. Whilst this agricultural activity may have caused some damage to any archaeological deposits predating this use, this damage is unlikely to have been extensive.

# **Archaeological Potential of the PSS:**

The site was developed as a military ammunition depot in 1939 (MSI1336). In 2011 a record was made of the surviving structures and their associated blast walls, which comprised two small (possibly fuse) stores, four large ammunition magazines, and an ARP shelter; the majority have since been demolished. The buildings which survived at that time Modern aerial photographs suggest that a store building (which had a large painted letter 'F' painted on the side) and its blast wall still survives in the northeast corner of the site.

A cropmark which may indicate the presences of a long barrow or pillow mound is visible on historic aerial photographs 160m to the south-east of the site. A Roman brooch has also been recovered c.240m to the east of the site (MSI1465). Although few other relevant archaeological sites have been previously recorded in the immediate vicinity of the site, this may be due to a lack of previous archaeological investigations across this area, rather than an absence of activity during the premedieval periods. There is therefore a potential for previously unidentified archaeological features, pre-dating the medieval and later agricultural use of this site, to survive across this area.

Further to the north and east can be found the settlement areas of Smith's Wood and Castle Bromwich and to the south Chelmsley Wood and Fordbridge, all of these are mostly post 1955 areas of settlement with pockets of interwar semi-detached houses.

The River Cole cuts across the bottom part of the wider surrounding area and with it areas of park and recreation such as Babbs Mill and Cole Valley County Park.

This historic core of Knowle is in the north while the majority of the rest of the settlement is post 1955 detached and semi-detached housing interspersed with a few blocks of earlier terraced housing.

In the eastern part of the wider area is a large block of small rectilinear fields, probably 18<sup>th</sup>/19<sup>th</sup> century enclosure. Around this are dispersed historic farmsteads (dating to at least the 19<sup>th</sup> century) and mixed fields with some on the floodplain of the beginnings of the Cuttle Brook.

There are two further areas of piecemeal enclosure, one in the south and one in the north and also a sewage works and part of the Grand Union Canal passing through the area with Knowle Locks a particular feature.

There is also a potential for features associated with the Meriden Union Workhouse, which was erected in 1793 across the eastern portion of the site, to survive across the site. Any archaeological features which survive across this site are likely to have been impacted by previous groundworks across this site.

A number of historic buildings, including the late 18th century Listed Building of Meriden Hotel (national ref. 1076742) and the 17th century Locally Listed 'The Old Pound House' to the south (23/357), the early to mid 19th century Listed 'The Laurels' (national ref. 1342857) to the south, and the Locally Listed 18th or early 19th century 'The Croft' to the south east, survive in the vicinity of the strategic site.

This indicates that this part of the site has been occupied since at least the earlier post-medieval period, if not earlier. A series of buildings which are shon on the 1st Edition

OS map of the area, suggesting they date to at least the later 1880s, are also associated with this farmhouse. There is a potential for archaeological features associated with the occupation of this area from at least the 17th century, if not earlier, to survive across this site.

Further buildings are shown on the 1st Edition OS map in the north-west corner of the site.

A large irregular rectangular enclosure is visible as a cropmark on aerial photographs to the immediate north of this proposed strategic site (MSI8582). It is presently undated, but may date from the prehistoric periods onwards. Further more tenuous cropmarks have also been recorded in the adjacent field (MSI 9065). Although few other archaeological sites pre-dating the medieval period have been previously recorded in the wider vicinity of the site, this may be due to a lack of previous archaeological investigations across this area, rather than an absence of activity during the pre-medieval periods. There is therefore a potential for previously unidentified archaeological features, pre-dating the medieval and later agricultural use of this site, to survive across this area. These may include archaeological deposits of regional or national importance, which may be worthy of preservation in situ.

The Grade II Listed Building of 239, Lugtrout Lane, which dates to the 17th century, lies to the immediate north-east of the site (national ref: 1203343, MSI287), and No 32A Marsh Lane, a Grade II Listed Building of 17th century date lies immediately to the south-west of site (national ref. 1076713, MSI258).

The site of Berry Hall Park and Gardens, lies immediately to the south of the proposed strategic site (MIS1217). The park and gardens were landscaped for New Berry Hall in late 19th century. Whilst New Berry Hall was demolished in the 1990s, the Grade II\* Listed Old Berry Hall, a timber framed house dating to the 15th century, and other historic buildings, lie within those gardens (national ref: 1342852, MSI295).

# Site Sensitivity to change:

#### Archaeology:

Development of this site is likely to have a significant negative archaeological impact upon any archaeological deposits which survive across this area. It is also likely to have an impact on, including the setting of, the historic buildings, including the Grade II Listed Field Farmhouse and 289 Lugtrout Road, which survive across, and in the wider vicinity of, this site. The development of this site may also have an impact on the setting of the historic Berry Hall park and gardens which lie to the south.



# Past Disturbance to the PSS:

It is probable that the majority of the site has been in agricultural use since at least the medieval period. Whilst this agricultural activity may have caused some damage to any archaeological deposits predating this use, this damage is unlikely to have been extensive. A small portion of the site has been used as a race track. The groundworks associated with its construction may have had an impact on any archaeological features present, however the extent of this impact is not presently known. Historic maps also suggest that there has also been some localised quarrying across parts of the site.

Parts of the site have been subject to recent gravel extraction. A programme of archaeological work is ongoing across those areas.

# **Archaeological Potential of the PSS:**

This proposed strategic site lies within an area of significant archaeological potential, with a number of known potential archaeological sites having been previously recorded across the site. In addition there is a potential for previously unidentified features to survive across this area.

Known features across the site include earthworks, including a possible pillow mound, which was recorded in the vicinity of the site of 'Warren Farm' which may be related to the use of this area for the breeding of rabbits (MSI5668).

Park Farmhouse, a Grade II\* Listed building dating to the late 18th or early 19th century (national ref: 1367098, MSI143), and associated historic buildings, survives just withen the eastern boundary of the site. It has been suggested that Park Farm originally formed part of the, since deserted, Hill Bickenhill Settlement (MSI10503), which it has been postulated lies in the eastern portion of the proposed strategic site. To the south lies the postulated location of the manor and settlement of Middle Bickenhill, which was founded as a secondary colony of Bickenhill (MSI10504), with the majority of the known homesteads being situated along Middle Bickenhill Lane.

A 16th or 17th century timber framed cottage survives on Middle Bickenhill Lane in the south of the site (MSI10537). Further buildings are shown along this lane on the 1840 Tithe map of this area, some of which may still be extant. The Tithe map also shows a farm complex, called Warren Farm on the 1880s 1st Edition OS map, in the north western part of the site, which was demolished in the later 20<sup>th</sup> century.

The 1st Edition OS map shows Bickenhill Common Farm in the northern part of the site. Whilst it has been suggested that one of the buildings still extant at that location dates to the late 18<sup>th</sup> or 19<sup>th</sup> century (MSI5764), this complex is not shown on the 1840 Tithe Map.

There is a potential for archaeological features associated with the occupation of these areas to survive across those parts of the site.

Two tollgates are shown on the southern and eastern boundaries of the site on the 1830s OS 1 inch to a mile map. However, it is probable that, due to road alignment changes, any archaeological features associated with these lie outside of the site boundary.

A possible mesolithic flint blade recovered from the site (MSI14004). A rectangular enclosure is visible as a cropmark on aerial photographs to the south of the proposed strategic site (MSI6960).

It is probable that the majority of the site has been in agricultural use since at least the medieval period. In addition to the potential for archaeological features associated with the settlements and other known/potential sites referred to above. there is a potential for as yet unidentified features, pre-dating the medieval and later agricultural use of this site, to survive across this area. # Past Disturbance to the PSS:

It is probable that the majority of the site has been in agricultural use since at least the medieval period. Parts of the site are now in use as sports pitches. Whilst this agricultural and later activity may have caused some damage to any archaeological deposits predating this use, this damage is unlikely to have been extensive. Aerial photographs also suggest that parts of the northern portion of the site have been subject to earth moving. The extent of the disturbance associated with this is presently unknown; it may have had an impact upon any archaeological deposits which survived across that portion of the site.

Parts of the site have already been developed; archaeological work was undertaken in advance of, and during, that development.

# **Archaeological Potential of the PSS:**

Archaeological work in 2014 in advance of the development of the south-east portion of this site identified a stone roman building and an associated well and field system (MSI10546, Daniel P, 2015, Land at Damson Parkway, Solihull, Archaeological Strip, Map and Excavation, Post-excavation Assessment. Wessex Archaeology). Recent archaeological trial trenching across the western portion of the site, associated with planning application PL/2016/03131/PPFL, for the erection of a logistics operations centre and associated works, identified two pits and a gully. Whilst these were not fully examined due to the site conditions, it was established that one of the pits contained Iron Age pottery and heat cracked pebbles (Gethin, B, 2017. Jaguar Land Rover, Proposed Logistics Operation Centre, Damson Parkway, Solihull. Archaeological Evaluation. Warwick: Archaeology Warwickshire). There is a potential

for further archaeological features associated with these known sites to survive across this strategic site.

Ridge and furrow associated with the agricultural use of this area survives across parts of the site.

A field in the northern portion of the site is labelled 'Windmill Field' on the 1840 Elmdon Tithe map. A mound, possibly the remains of the windmill, has been previously noted in this area (MSI3117).

A water course runs along the eastern boundary of the site; as water courses were often the focus of prehistoric activity, there is a potential for features such as burnt mounds being located in its vicinity.

In addition to the potential for archaeological features associated with these known sites to extend across this site, there is also a potential for previously unidentified archaeological features, pre-dating the medieval and later agricultural use of this site, to survive across this area. These may include archaeological deposits of regional or national importance, which may be worthy of preservation in situ.

The Late 18th or early 19th century Grade II Listed Elmdon Hall Lodge lies in the north-western corner of the site (National ref. 1054763, DSI48, MSI145). The Grade II Listed 17th century Castle Hills Farmhouse (national ref. 1075950, DSI92, MSI146).
