Give Gadgets a Try

In Adult social care we have set a new target relating to 'useful gadgets'. We are already finding that the results of using gadgets are good – they promote independence, quality of life and cost effectiveness – so we want to make sure that as many people possible can benefit. The target is that 1 in 4 assessments and reviews in adult social care should result in a referral for assistive technology and telecare. We are hoping that this target will help individual teams and workers to put their training into practice, and give gadgets a try. Box of Tricks

The Gadgets Group (gadget users and their carers) has begun offering demonstrations of useful gadgets called 'Box of Tricks' alongside the council's Gadgets Team. Home Hazard Assessments

Solihull Community Housing (SCH) are offering a new service that aims to reduce falls at home. The team assess people's home, identify possible causes of falls and arrange minor repairs or installation of simple equipment (up to the value of £150) to reduce these risks. The service is funded by Solihull Clinical Commissioning Group and is closely linked to SCH's Telecare service which provides gadgets. Gadgets are often part of the solution to prevent falls. Paper thin bed occupancy sensor

What is it?

A bed occupancy sensor, that can detect when a person leaves (or falls from) their bed. Can also be used to detect when someone leaves (or falls from) a chair.



What does it do?

If an individual is at risk of falls or injuring themselves trying to get out of bed (or when they have left bed), this bed sensor immediately raises an alarm to inform carers.

How does it work?

It is placed on top of the mattress or back rest of the chair and works using dielectric signals. This means that it detects how close the individual is to the sensor and monitors movement and change in position. Most bed or chair sensors work by changes in pressure (the weight of the person's body). Studies completed by the manufacturer prove this sensor can reduce potential false alarms compared to traditional bed sensors.

The paper thin bed occupancy sensor can work with any type of bed or mattress; for example it is ideal for an electric profiling bed and air flow mattress where other bed sensors may not work very well. This means it is suitable for individuals who are prone to pressure sores/ ulcers.

The sensor is waterproof and easy to clean. Sensor sheets can be cut to any size and be positioned as required, for example it can fit into different types of chair.

Limitations

- Currently it only works with the manufacturer's 'neo care phone' rather than other telecare systems. However it will soon be compatible with Tynetec and Tunstall equipment (the largest providers of telecare equipment).
- Like other bed sensors it may need to be replaced on a regular basis.

How to get hold of it

gadgets case studies

Mrs Gilbert and Just Checking

Mrs Gilbert has dementia and diabetes. She lives alone and her daughters live in other parts of the UK. She receives daily support from a Care Agency and from a Community Nurse. She has a pendant alarm from Solihull Community Housing's Safe & Sound scheme.



Following a fall, Mrs Gilbert was admitted to hospital. Her memory and diabetes had both got worse. Her Social Worker and family members were concerned that she wasn't sleeping well and might be letting strangers into her property. They were worried that she might need residential care.



The Social Worker decided that using the Just Checking electronic assessment tool would provide evidence about Mrs Gilbert's ability to live independently. Mrs Gilbert was happy to use the equipment so it was installed by the Gadgets Team.

After 3 weeks the Telecare Officer wrote a summary report of the findings and fed them back to Mrs Gilbert, her daughters and her Social Worker.

The main findings were:

- Mrs Gilbert's night time routine was not unusual
- There was no evidence of unexpected visitors
- Mrs Gilbert was spending long periods of time alone at home

The result

- Solihull Community Housing provided a wrist-worn falls detector in case Mrs Gilbert had another serious fall
- Mrs Gilbert, her family and the Social Worker agreed that existing care/support arrangements were satisfactory
- The Social Worker worked with Mrs Gilbert to support increased day-time activities
- The lack of unexpected visitors reassured Mrs Gilbert's family that she was
